New Owners of Blueberry Plantation Move To Alma

The Blueberry Plantation and Golf Course has been purchased by Zhao Khan. LLC. of Melbourne, Florida.

The new owners are Shiya "Spring" Zhao and Yousaf "Joseph" Khan.

"We fell in love with Alma and its people when we came to see the property", said Joseph Khan. Both said they were amazed at how friendly the people were to someone from out of town.

But at first when he heard and saw the property was for sale he thought it was in the middle of no where.

"My wife told me I should respect the real-estate person's efforts and go see the property, so I did."

Joseph Khan has operated a successful furniture business for the past ten years in Melbourne. He brings good management and sales experience to Alma. "My husband is the best salesman I have ever met," Spring said.

He and Spring explained they want to change the nature of the plantation of golf course to more of a resort with mansion accommodations and a resort type atmosphere for Bacon County and the region.

The new name will be the Blueberry Mansion, Golf Course and Resort. "It's like we found the shining diamond in the rough," Spring exclaimed.

Their plans started last week with the adding of a new chef and additional staff for the Blueberry Mansion's restaurant.

Joseph, a former chef, and Spring have good culinary skills and plans to expand and improve the menu.

Spring has two MA degrees in Electrical Engineering and an MBA degree from the Florida Institute of Technology.

She has a solid business background, her family has a large construction and concrete business with multiple warehouses in China.

The couple's plans include broadening the menu and "spicing up" some new Italian dishes and adding more local favorite dishes. They ask that anyone please give suggestions and recommendations for the menu.

The two said they plan to add very nice furniture and remodeling is in the future. Again with their furniture experience, plans will be for that "resort type" feel at the mansion.

The facility is open seven days a week, except the restaurant. Sunday brunch will begin early and last through the day for local members, golfers and after church guests.

Special events are scheduled like different blueberry contests, Disney night for kids, a girls night out, nightly specials, Karaoke night, a new sports bar with TV's and multi-games.

Governor Bryan Kemp Visits Bacon County

"We have the lowest unemployment rate in years, we have the most people in the work force and we need another good agriculture cycle with good weather for rural Georgia," explained Governor Brian Kemp.

Kemp spoke to some 70 citizens from Alma on Friday morning as he stopped in at the Blueberry Mansion.

County Commission Chairman Andy Hutto introduced Kemp and said he was one of the most personable men that had ever served as a Governor and Secretary of the State.

Hutto said Kemp spoke at the graduation services of his granddaughter at Valdosta State College. Following the service, Hutto text Kemp to congratulate him on his speech and what a good experience it was for the granddaughter. Kemp in turn text Hutto's granddaughter and congratulated her on her graduation.

Hutto said what better text could you get.

Kemp said Georgia has been named the number one state in business by Site Selection Magazine for a record-breaking seventh year in a row.. Two examples were he recently attended expansion of businesses in Bainbridge with over 600 new employees and over 100 in Sylvania.
