1. MR. PURPLE. *This new Lower East Side venue, which takes its name from a 1970s human rights activist and local legend, made headlines when it first opened, as a reminder of just how quickly this former traditionally working-class downtown district became gentrified. This new bar-restaurant, with its wide bay windows and two outdoor rooftop terraces (one with swimming pool), affords spectacular panoramic views over Manhattan, from the 15th floor of the Hotel Indigo.*

1. MANKO PARIS. *Cecile has come to Avenue Montaigne, in*



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2. BORO HOTEL. *Located alongside the East River, the first boutique hotel in Dutch Kills, an up-and-coming area of Long Island City (Queens), affords breathtaking views of Manhattan from its 108 rooms, all with balconies and terraces. After a trip to the MoMA PS1 or the Noguchi Museum, a cocktail is in order in the rooftop bar of this 13-story industrial building, which boasts visible concrete panels, warmed by wood finishes, a large communal table and a vast streamlined fireplace.*

3. VANDAL. *At this new bar and restaurant with Peruvian, Argentinian, Vietnamese and other influences, chef Chris Santos and the TFO Group combine street art and street food right in the heart of the Doxerry, which used to be the punk district on the Lower East Side. The subversive urban decor on two floors sends its way through a maze of private lounges, dining rooms and bars, with propaganda posters, art installations and murals (including work by street art star Hush). This wonderful labyrinth even has a botanical garden gallery designed in conjunction with Ocarina floral services.*

4. COSME. *It's now Mexican gastronomy's turn to take pride of place in the heart of buzzing New York, following in the wake of French cuisine, Nordic food and a tide of noodle bars. Enrique Olvera's innovative cuisine is proof of this, in the Flatiron Building district. The good news is that the folksy decor has been ditched, which hasn't kept diners from swooning sublime blue shrimp or le Percecruzano or duck enchiladas washed down with a house Margarita-Cimarrón.*
